Cotton & Mothballs - Marianna Garrett

I was given a large amount of fabric for the charity quilts. The stuff had a strong smell of mothballs, so I put a load in wash machine. I went to put it in dryer and it still smelled strongly of mothballs. Went to Google, how to get it out. Uh oh. Best way is to air it out in the breeze and indirect sunshine. That is a few more months away, for this area. Or wash in vinegar. The vinegar wash did nothing to help. So the stuff is safely stored till summer, as it is very large pieces of nice stuff.

- 1. Moths do not eat or affect cottons, at all. Mothballs are not needed. Just keep cottons dry. Mildew is the enemy of cotton.
 - * Mildew remedy. If cottons are just musty and do not have black discoloration, just wash in a weak bleach wash with hot water. I use Lysol liquid laundry sanitizer with my vintage finds. Dry completely in dryer, then iron with a very hot iron.
- 2. Mothballs are very toxic, even when used for your woolens. Be careful with their use, look for alternatives.
- 3. Don't try to wash smell out, it wont. It must be aired, outdoors if possible, in a breeze. It will not air out in dryer with Febreeze!

With the high cost of fabrics now, we must learn how to properly store and care for them.

Dues are Due! - Jill Ellis, Membership

Our year runs May 1 through April 30 (because we're CrAzY Quilters), and the annual dues are \$30. At the January business meeting, a discussion was held about newsletters that are printed and mailed 11 times a year. A stamp is currently 49 cents, so 11 newsletters per year costs \$5.39 per person. We currently have 10 members getting their newsletters by U.S. Postal Service. A discussion was held about charging \$5 more per year for dues for those who want a printed/mailed newsletter; a vote was taken and it was passed. This change will start with our new year and the May newsletter. As everyone pays their dues, I will make sure to ask those now receiving newsletters via the mail if they still want to receive their newsletter that way, and make sure their dues is \$35. Another option: If you don't have email, you can pick up your copy of the newsletter at the business meeting each month, though you won't be getting reminders 4 days prior to the meeting about programs, or what you need to bring (potluck, Block in a Box, etc.). If you're not at the business meeting, I will hold onto copies until the next meeting, but won't mail to out. You could always read it on the website, too.

Our June retreat will be Father's Day Weekend, June 19-22. 2016 will also be Father's Day weekend. Quilt Show: Challenge Project - Kay Thomas, Chair

The theme for the show this year is, "Imagination"? Your imagination will be stretched in a new direction with the challenge project I've dreamed up this time.

Your mission, should you decide to accept it, will be designing and creating a stocking for any Holiday or special occasion

EXCEPT Christmas. Let's be trend setters. We're Crazy Quilters, now let's prove the crazy.

Imagine a stocking for:

- Valentine's Day: imagine the goodies that could go in there.
- Easter: more goodies and a bunny, too.
- Mother's and/or Father's Day: appliances won't fit.
- 4th of July: don't hang this one near the chimney.
- Halloween: wouldn't it be fun to pass out candy from a Halloween stocking?
- Birthday: specific to a person or a whole family. Would be fun to have a birthday stocking to wake up to.
- · Anniversary: Sweet tradition to start for a new couple.

...to name a few.

The intention is that your stocking be used at least once a year according to its purpose. It should not commemorate a special vacation or event, because those would not be celebrated or observed on a regular basis.

Perhaps you are an avid gardener and seed collector. Maybe your garden stocking could hold seed packets, new gloves, etc in anticipation of your annual garden.

I'm sure you'll have unique ideas too, just be sure your stocking has a yearly or regular basis use.

ABSOLUTE REQUIREMENTS:

- The size can range anywhere between 8 and 18 inches tall, and the width needs to be proportionate to the height.
- It must be a functional stocking, able to hold items.
- It must have a loop attached for hanging. The loop should not extend above the top of the stocking by more than 2.5 inches.
- It must have a purpose. You will need to include a short paragraph explaining the occasion and reason for your choice that can be displayed at the show.

It may be hard to shift from a Christmas mindset in regards to stockings since we've just finished preparing and recovering from Christmas. Light a candle, relax. Your brilliant idea might surface in a tipped glass of wine.

Please consider participating in this challenge. It's sure to gain attention and interest at our show in October. This will not be a judged competition other than having a daily People's Choice, where votes will be deposited in your stocking. The challenge is thinking outside the box and creating a stocking for an untraditional purpose and hopefully starting a new tradition.

If you are now thinking, "What a crazy, hair-brained idea this!", I thank you! I'm going to take that as flattery, intended or not.:-D



Cut:

- 2 6.5-inch dark squares (scrappy)
- 4 3.5-inch light squares (scrappy)
- 4 3.5-inch BLACK squares

Please make sure your black squares are positioned so the diagonal is going in the correct direction. Your block should measure 12.5 inches

Quilt Show 2015: Boutique - Sharon Meeds, Boutique Co-Chair

Here are a few thoughts for our quilting friends as we draw nearer to our October Quilt Show!

The Boutique will feature both donated and consignment items, which includes handmade or gently used items. (We are not calling anything a Garage Sale.)

Donated Items: We would love to have many wonderful, handmade items donated for our Boutique Sale. Pincushions, cord minders, aprons, and tote bags are some suggestions. Gently used patterns and guilt books are also great. The Guild benefits 100% from the items sold in the "donated" category.

Consigned Items:

- People wishing to have items consigned to the Boutique for their own sales will pay, in advance, \$25.00 to the Crazy Quilters Guild. Think of this as your "booth fee," the same you would be charged if you were taking part in a Christmas bazaar at a local school or church or event.
- Items consigned by our members will need to have sales tax charged at the Federal Way rate, which is currently 9.5%.
- Consigned items will need to have tax figured into the cost for instance, you have an item you are willing to sell for \$10.00. That would be \$.95 in sales tax. Please price your item at \$10.50 or \$11.00. Please DO NOT price items at \$11.35. In other words, please use round numbers and a note on your sales tag that says "tax included".
- · Members consigning items will need to have a state-issued Temporary Business License; there is a temporary business license for special events, which has no charge. A "temporary business" is defined as no more than two events per year with each event lasting less than one month. Each certificate is good for only one event. Yes, the individuals need to collect sales tax on their sales. The link is here. http://dor.wa.gov/content/doingbusiness/BusinessTypes/Doingbus_tempreg.aspx
- · Consigners of their own goods will be given a number which must be on the sales tag of their item. This is to assure that you get the money due to you. You will be paying your own sales tax from the proceeds of your sales, after accounting is completed by the Quilt Show Treasurer.
- Items that are donated for Guild sales will not have a consignment number, nor any designation other than the cost.

Tips - found on the Martingle.com website

From Schnibbles Times Two by Carrie Nelson: I always do one last thing before my quilt top is truly finished and ready to be quilted: I always **stay-stitch around the outer edge of the quilt top**, stitching about 1/8 of an inch from the edge. This helps keep the edges from stretching and also prevents seams on my pieced borders from separating. Most of the quilters I've worked with say it helps, especially if you're planning to have your quilt top professionally machine quilted.

Kim's Pin Points: Color and Design

- Having trouble finding fabric in just the right color for your quilt? Try using the wrong side of a printed fabric.
- When arranging your blocks into a quilt top, always position pieces with strong hues in the corners. This will clearly define and anchor your quilt center.
- The value of any print can change depending upon the colors that are positioned immediately next to it. If putting a light print
 into a quilt top that largely features darker tones, position it next to a medium-toned print to minimize the difference. The
 medium print acts as a bridge to blend the surrounding colors, and the lighter print adds interest without distracting from the
 overall look of the quilt.

Kim's Pin Points: Staying Organized

- When you begin a new project, take a moment to wind three or four bobbins. You'll save time later!
- To easily organize patchwork sets or appliqué pieces, especially for travel or classes, layer them between paper plates.
 Notes or instructions can be written directly on each plate, and the plates can be stacked together to keep your work neat, compact, and easily portable.
- If you are constantly losing your scissors, apply a 3M hook to the side surface of your sewing machine or an adjacent wall. Hang a pair of scissors on your new holder, and they'll never be lost again.

Kim's Pin Points: Machine Sewing

- As you begin sewing a machine-stitched seam, grasp the spool and bobbin threads and pull them gently as the fabric begins to feed under the presser foot. This will enable the fabric to feed smoothly and will also prevent thread snarls.
- For patchwork that includes layered triangles or squares that are pinned together or joined with a diagonal seam, pin the pieces together as usual, then place a small dot of basting glue within the seam-allowance layers near each point to prevent them from shifting as you stitch. Your stitched patchwork will always have perfectly aligned edges.
- If your pieced blocks are consistently just a bit small, even when using a quarter-inch foot, here's a quick little trick that may
 make a difference in your accuracy. For sewing machines with incremental needle positions, try setting the needle just one
 notch to the right of the center position. Sew a test block and measure your results—this slight adjustment can be just
 enough to compensate for the thread or two that is lost to the fold of fabric when your seam allowances are pressed.
- To increase your accuracy, when you seat yourself at your sewing machine, position your chair squarely in front of the
 needle. This may seem overly simple, but sitting at even a slight angle to the needle can distort your view as you sew and
 cause variances in your seam allowances.

Kim's Pin Points: Pressing

- To save time as you press, position your ironing board next to your sewing machine at table height, eliminating extra steps.
- If your iron doesn't feature a nonstick pressing surface and it begins to show signs of residue build-up, unplug the iron and let it rest until the pressing surface is cool to the touch. Next, gently rub a dampened Mr. Clean Magic Eraser over the plate to remove any build-up, then wipe thoroughly with a clean dry cloth.
- To easily protect your ironing board surface and keep it in "like-new" condition for longer, try ironing a sheet of freezer paper onto the cloth pad before you begin pressing your appliqués. The paper will protect the surface from any fabric adhesives, and once your pressing is complete it can be peeled away and discarded.
- For a quick and portable pressing board, particularly for classes, cut a square or rectangle of corrugated cardboard from a sturdy box. In addition to being lightweight and disposable, cardboard makes a perfectly flat and firm work area that can be ideal for achieving well-pressed appliqué edges, and the finish enables your iron to glide smoothly across the surface.

Kim's Pin Points: Smart Tips for Every Quilter

- For wall hangings that lie smooth and flat, place a second hanging sleeve at the bottom edge of the quilt and insert a small dowel or flat strip of wood that has been cut slightly narrower than the width of the quilt. The added weight will eliminate any ripples and your piece will hang beautifully.
- When "un-sewing" a seam, a clean eraser or the sticky side of a length of masking tape can be lightly rubbed over any
 remaining threads to loosen and remove them from the cloth.
- Consider using quilting thread when hand sewing your binding to the back of your quilt. The fibers are made to be pulled through the layers multiple times, so there will be less fraying and tangling, and your stitches will be sturdier.
- When you are signing quilt labels or signature blocks, first iron a piece of freezer paper to the wrong side of the fabric to stabilize it. Remove the paper after you complete the writing.
- For quick cleanup after sewing, wrap masking tape around your fingers, adhesive side out, and use it to retrieve fallen
 threads and fabric scraps from your carpeting and clothing.
