Safe Sewing Tip - Contributed by Carol Berge

The chief of our fire department told us to never use polyester in a baby quilt. Always use 100% cotton batting. If they go in house on fire they grab the first blanket they find to wrap the baby in. If it is made with polyester it will melt to the baby's skin. Cotton will not and it can take the heat from the fire.





Fellow quilters – It's just a month till our Quilt Show! Wow – how time flies. This is information for you who are planning on selling your own goods at the Show and for you who are donating items for the Guild Boutique.

This year everything will be in the same area. The sellers will have tickets (including tax!) in their price and will be assigned a number. Items donated to the Guild for sale should be priced (it makes life so much easier at set-up) and you know what your item is worth.

On Sunday, consignment sellers are responsible for getting any of their unsold items. Those who donated, if you want your items back, you are responsible for getting them on Sunday after the show. We will not be bringing things back to a guild meeting (our November meeting is a program and our December meeting is our Christmas party/potluck), because we are not holding on to them until January. All items not taken home will be donated.

Those of you donating items: we will have a list that you will need to sign as to whether it is okay to mark your items down on Sunday. It is also okay if you do not want your items marked down. A quilt top is worth as much at the end as at the beginning to me.

Set-up will be on Thursday, October 22, from 10 a.m. until 7:30 p.m. We will be setting up the donated items, but individual consignment people MUST bring and set their own items. Please DO NOT bring anything to do a "first-time" set-up on Friday, although you may restock your items during the show.

And lastly, we are aiming at "quilting/crafting/sewing" type items. We would love to have many wonderful, handmade items donated for our Boutique Sale. Pincushions, cord minders, aprons, tote bags, gently used patterns and quilt books are just a few suggestions. The guild benefits 100% from the items sold in the "donated" category.

Quilts at the Washington State Fair in Puyallup

Several members of Crazy Quilters had quilts entered in the fair this year, and some won ribbons. I apologize if I missed anyone. I found myself looking for names, forgetting to enjoy looking at the quilts. Diana Rawlings, Carolyn Jones (I assume it was OUR Carolyn Jones), Carol Berge, Pam Elliott, and I all had quilts entered. Diana entered two quilts, and one won an Honorable mention ribbon. Teresa won a First-Place ribbon and Best in Category on her chicken quilt. Pam won an Honorable Mention ribbon. I entered two items and won a third-place ribbon on a table runner. There was a quilt by a woman named Sheryl Ramstad that won a ribbon, quilted by Eileen "Pilcher"; it's my assumption that's supposed to be Eileen Peacher and someone misread the paperwork. Good job to all of our members for promoting the art of quilting, and congrats to the ribbon winners! P.S. I must be doing something wrong when determining which category to put my quilts in when doing the online 'paperwork', because I saw people with more than five quilts in the fair, all close to the same size, seemingly in the "small quilts" category, and I tried to enter a second quilt in that category and the system wouldn't let me. I'm going to investigate that next year.



Two years ago, Maddie Hall and Elizabeth Darling took on the task of scanning photos from albums compiled over the years, then putting them on our website. I said I would write the names of the people I recognized on sticky notes and put them on each photo. I did that for four albums, but still had four sitting in my kitchen until recently, when Maddie said she'd like to get that project done. She doesn't

like UFOs, and I'm a procrastinator—this might not have been the best matchup for a project. However, I finished up with the photos and took them to Maddie this past week.

One of the final photo albums I went through was from 2006. In that book, there were photos of most of the guild members who have passed away while I've been in the guild. Every time I turned a page, I'd say, "Awwwww, there's Nita," or, "There's Peggy." I don't remember the year these ladies passed, and I don't recall the causes of their deaths, but they were all members for several years. I wrote down names of five ladies who were guild members, but as I'm typing this, I have come up with three more. There may be former members who have passed that I don't know about.

Peggy Burgess did really wonderful applique work and had a smile that lit up her face.

Virginia Creelman also did exquisite applique and had a great laugh.

Nita Leiser made her own fleece socks and always wore Birkenstocks. Nita was hard of hearing and probably thought she was whispering at meetings, but she wasn't. ©

Fran Hubner bought lots of fabric, LOTS of fabric; I believe the guild has bought batting from her estate twice. Fran made aprons for an ice cream store on the coast and had run out of fabric with ice cream images, so I gave her several yards I had. It wasn't the first time she hugged me and it wasn't the last, but it was the best hug, because she was so happy I had some fabric she needed and she squeezed me big time.

Royce Gilcrease was one of our quieter members, at least at the meetings. At her funeral, I learned Royce liked doing wild and wacky things, and her cheesecake was mentioned by several friends and family members as being a masterpiece.

Clara Gallas showed some great quilts at Show & Tell. I remember she once said she didn't make bed quilts any more, because how many do people need? I was kind of startled at that, thinking, "You can quit making quilts?"

Mary Meyers belonged to Evergreen Piecemakers, Puyallup Valley Quilters, and Crazy Quilters. She sewed regularly on Friday nights with a group of friends, and when she passed, Mary's friends sorted out all of her quilting "stuff" and divided it up between her three guilds. Each guild held an auction and made more than \$2000. I have several things I bought at Mary's auction, mostly baggies of five- and four-inch squares, but I have been reluctant to do anything with them yet.

Mauvaneen McMullen was the person I felt closest to of those we have lost. Her smile was like a beacon, and I always looked for it on the television commercials she did for local companies. I drove past Mary's house on my way to my vanpool every morning, and I would call and ask why her lights were on at 4:45 a.m. Her sense of humor and quick wit were delightful.

We may have lost other ladies who were members at one time, but I can't recall hearing any names. Arline Dailly had Alzheimer's and I'm not sure of her status.

Everyone leaves a legacy and memories. I've been in Crazy Quilters for 20+ years. I have great memories of so many people, not just the ones who are no longer here. Going through those photo albums made me a bit sad, but I mostly smiled to see sweet faces of old friends.

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
