

News from the Publishing World of Quilting – found in the August issue of STASHED! By Generation Q Magazine

American Quilter's Society announced it will cease to publish quilting books in 2017. Books from the current inventory are still available to purchase. In a news release, AQS said it will increase its focus on membership, QuiltWeek events, iquilt online classes, and *American Quilter Magazine*.





In other news, *Quilters Newsletter* magazine is no more. Parent Company F + W Media has benched *Quilters* Newsletter magazine. The October-November 2016 will be the last issue. There was no reason given for the shutdown. *Quilters Newsletter* started 47 years ago. Founding editor, Bonnie Leman, composed the debut issue on a manual typewriter at her kitchen table. It was the first, and for many years, the only, magazine devoted to the interests of quilters.

The board of directors managing the Machine Quilters Showcase and the International Machine Quilters Association voted to dissolve both organizations. This brings to an end MQS shows, technology showcases, an email newsletter, and quarterly magazine, "OnTrack."

- 7. Pictures will be posted of the original panel and the finished quilt.

February: Grace Errea will give a presentation on "Heat-set Applique", with the possibility of a workshop following at MAC, to be decided at a later date.
- Adjourned at 8:58 pm.



A few weeks ago, I decided I needed to find something to keep me occupied in the evenings, rather than sit down, stare at the TV for a few minutes, the fall asleep for an hour or two, waking up in the middle of Wheel of Fortune or Jeopardy. I started working on scrap quilts using the 2.5-inch squares I have from the exchange we did as a guild a few years ago. I also cut my scraps into 1.5-, 2.0-, and 2.5-inch squares, so I have a huge box

of 2.5-inches squares to use up. What I have found is some of those squares are not square, some of them are not 2.5 inches, some of them are not cotton, and some of them are the ugliest fabrics I have ever seen, leaving me to wonder, "Who thought this was pretty enough to buy?" Everyone's tastes are different, yes, but my, there is some very ugly fabric in the world.

So, I've made components for 16 blocks that each used 97 squares. That's 1552 total squares for the quilt, for those of you who were wondering. They will be joined by yellow sashing strips, making each block 22 inches, though once I trim the blocks up, they may be a bit less. Either way, it's going to be a big quilt. I'm going to a retreat in October, so I've put the blocks and the sashing strips in a basket, ready to take to retreat.

Last night, I finished the blocks for another scrap quilt, which will be a total of 81 blocks. The primary block is 16 squares, and the secondary block is four 2.5-inch squares and two 3.5-inch pieces. That's a total of 816 of those 2.5-inch squares (and 80 3.5-inch pieces). Those 81 blocks are now in the basket, along with border material, ready for the October retreat. My plan is to do minimal cutting and a lot of sewing.

I've made the 4-patch units for a third scrap quilt, 35 blocks, each of which will use five 4-patches (and they'll have 4 half-square triangle units per block, made from yardage). That's a grand total of 3068 of those 2.5-inch squares from my bin—AND my bin is only half empty. Don't worry, though: I have more ideas. Kay Thomas thinks we should do another 2.5-inch square exchange—anyone interested?? It's apparently a very good way to get rid of all kinds of ugly fabric. ©

On to another quilting venture. Most of you know about the Row by Row Experience going on (rowbyrowexperience.com), where participating quilt shops have designed a 3-foot row (this year's theme is, "Home"). You can pick up a free pattern in the shops (every U.S. state is participating, along with Canada and a couple of countries in Europe), or you can purchase a kit to make the row. I looked over the list of Washington shops and marked the ones I wanted to get. A friend from work, Lois, was going camping in Eastern WA, so she picked up kits for me from Leavenworth, Omak, and Waterville (one of those was applique, but I paid for it, even though I more-than-likely won't get around to making it). Lois also sent me patterns for other shops she stopped at (illegal, yes, but I probably won't make them because they're the A word) and a couple patterns she got when she was on vacation in Wisconsin. When I went to Montana in July, I got kits from five Montana shops, one in Idaho, and two in Spokane. Sharon Meeds very kindly picked me up the kit from the Cle Elum store, and Jana McLeod got me the kit from Freeland and couple of patterns from Lynden shops. Then I got a great idea: Road Trip to Oregon and SW Washington for the kits I wanted there.

My new car came with Sirius FM radio, which means there are no pesky commercials. However, I will NEVER pay for radio (I said that decades ago about TV, but now we don't have a choice), so I decided to take a road trip this past Saturday because my free Sirius will expire this Friday. I went to the furthest location first, Eugene OR, figuring if I didn't get to the Woodland and Longview (WA) shops before 5, I could always go down next weekend—what's two hours each way when you're on a mission? I hit the freeway Saturday morning at 7:30 (got a late start—I'm a dawdler in the morning), and drove to Eugene, which took about 4.5 hours. I went from there to Salem, where I was kind of lost after leaving the quilt shop, trying to find a gas station. I have a GPS, but when I plug it in, I get a "do you want to connect to the computer?" message, and then it won't do anything. I had to charge up the GPS, unplug it, turn it on, then put in the address. I was alternately using my cell phone navigation and the GPS, but when I was looking for gas, the GPS battery wasn't charged enough to look for a gas station. I was in a residential neighborhood, so pulled up to a car where three men had just emerged, and said, "Excuse me, can you tell me where I can find a gas station?" I asked a man who was probably the only non-English speaking person in the neighborhood (that's how my luck runs), but his son was able to tell which way to go. You can't fill up your own car in Oregon and I wasn't sure if I was supposed to tip the nice young man who pumped my gas, so I went in to buy a bottle of water and get change to tip him (I had a bottle of water in the car, but the 20 minutes I was in the Eugene store had left it not quite hot enough to boil an egg, but close). From Salem, I headed toward Portland. Portland is a city of bridges crisscrossing the Willamette and Columbia rivers. My fear of heights made me grateful I didn't have to go over the GIGANTOR bridge that goes toward downtown (I did that a few years back, going to a concert, and would have been whimpering in fear if not for my friend, Cynthia, who probably would've laughed at me from the passenger seat). I had to take the Hawthorne bridge, much smaller, but it seemed rickety enough to make me grip the steering wheel tight enough to make my fingers white. I found the shop, got my kit, and hit I-5 with plenty of time to get to Woodland and Longview before meeting a friend in Castle Rock for dinner at 5—or so I thought. Getting over the bridge above the Columbia River took for freakin' ever, and it was 102 degrees—even with air conditioning, it was kind of muggy. I don't know why traffic sped up once we got to the Washington side of the bridge, because it was the same amount of lanes, but it was just enough of a slowdown that I got to the Woodland store and it had closed 7 minutes earlier. The lights were on inside, but I didn't want to pound on the door and look desperate, so I continued on to Longview (I called to make sure they closed at 5 instead of 4, something I should have done for the Woodland shop). Got my kit, headed to Kelso's The Paisley Duck, because I wanted their license plate, which said, "Shut the Duck Up"—cracked me up, or should I say, 'quacked'? I called to see what time they closed; someone answered and when I asked, said they closed at 4. I wanted to ask why they were answering the phone at 4:40 if they were closed, but I just said, "Poop!" which made the lady laugh. Went off to Castle Rock to have dinner with Sandy, where we had a lovely three hours of conversation. I headed home just before 9, got home at 10:30. I fed the cats, washed my face, brushed my teeth, and fell into bed. I was pretty pooped all day Sunday, but managed to get those blocks done, though not much else. Now I have to think about how to make 30 rows fit into one guilt top—probably going to be a two-sided guilt. Future UFO.... Page 5
