President's Ponderings Mary Ann Morris

It is September, the Washington State Fair is on and soon to be over. I want to thank all of the ladies who will be tying quilts at the fair--- I know that we will have lots of fun.

Char Peterson got us a good speaker for our program night. Marsha Sable of More the Merrier Pattern Company showed us some of her great quilts. I bought one of her quilt patterns--now to find the time to do it. Thank you, Char.

Let's take a walk down memory lane: Do you remember an old commercial for Lowe's or Home Depot, where a couple is standing in the tool aisle. The husband has a tool in his hand and he tells his wife that he has to get this tool. His wife asks, "Don't you already have one of them?" and he answers, "Yes, but not in this color!" How many yards of material do we have in all colors and patterns and yet we never have just the color that we need? The next commercial, he is again in the tool aisle, holding a tool, and the wife asks what it does. He answers, "I don't know, but it will look good on my pegboard!" How many of us have duplicates of some of our tools? My husband has told me he is going to put a lock on his tool box so I will have to go to the hardware store and buy my own tools, or he will go and get replacement tools. When we go into a fabric shop, how many of us look at all the tools to see if there is something new that we just have to have? I know that I do this all the time, as does my husband in the hardware store. I have lots of rulers, seam rippers, scissors, thread nippers, and marking tools like you would not believe.

When you are starting another quilt, you have picked out your pattern and your colors, and you want to know if you have a good mix of lights and darks, there are a few ways to tell. One way is to take a picture and print it in black and white, which will tell you if you have enough contrast in your fabrics. Another way is to use a pair of special glasses that have deep red lenses, which will block out all color so you will only see light or dark. Now that I have told you how to do it, I will tell you how I do it. I usually pick out my colors not by value so much, but more by if I like the colors together, and then I look for the pattern that will fit my fabric. Sometimes I will fall in love with a pattern and than I will start collecting the fabric that I want to use in it. It may take a year or more to find the right fabric, but that is part of the fun of making a quilt, don't you think?

Well that is it for this month. Our business meeting is this week, and the program for October Anita Siegenthaler showing us how to do Millefiori. This should be a fun night. Thanks for stopping by.



- 6. There will be prizes: most creative; best use of panel, prettiest, and anything else Tina McCarter and I can come up with.
- 7. Pictures will be posted of the original panel and the finished quilt.
- 8. It's for fun and for our community charities!

Quilt Show 2017????? It's Decision Time – Linda Hill

Almost a year has passed since we held our last quilt show, which was a success, if I do say so myself. Now the time has come for us to decide if we are going to hold our bi-annual quilt show in 2017. Well, if we are, we need to get moving **NOW**.

To have a show in 2017, *within the next month*, we need to have someone volunteer to be the Chairwoman for the show; secure a venue; set a date; decide on a theme; start publicizing our show; form a Planning Committee.

Planning a guilt show is very similar to making a guilt. For a guilt, you:

• pick a pattern; choose fabric; determine the logical, simplest way to put each block together; sew the blocks; play with the blocks to determine layout; sew top together; add batting and backing; quilt as desired.

For a quilt show, you:

 Pick out a location; set a date; choose a theme; form a planning committee made up of a Show Chairwoman and Committee Chairs for location, publicity, registration, vendors, raffles, coordinate volunteers, coordinate tea room, quilt submission, set up, take down; work hard pulling everything together; display our creations for our viewing audience.

There is no doubt about it: planning a quilt show takes a lot of time and energy, but many members working together makes it doable. Some of the committee chairs from the 2015 show are stepping down (but they will share their expertise). And I am still sitting on my hands!

It is time for other members to step forward and face the challenges and joys of planning a successful quilt show. Are you one of the "other members" who will step up?

I like to party...and by "party, I mean stay home and sew.

Life isn't about finding yourself. It's about finding the perfect fabric and never cutting it.
