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Musings from Mary Ann

Our program presenter was but a little short, but had some beautiful work. Made me think about last year when I was going to learn to do applique and here it is over a year later and I still have trouble doing appliqué. We all know that the road to he\$\$ is paved with good intentions; my road is either super long or super wide. Don't forget our business meeting this Thursday.

Marianna Garrett is working hard to get our raffle quilt out to the public. She could use some help with this especially this fall. She is also busy getting our next year's quilt done. So if you can help her even for a few hours it would be good.

Now how about some more tips and laughs for this month - - -

For applique: Helen Anderson said that she likes to baste the seam allowances under an appliqué piece, it makes the whole process easier, and she can sew faster. Kay Hineman likes to cut doubles of each appliqué piece, sew them right sides together then slit the back turn right side out and press. She then topstitches it by machine right next to the edge. The piece is now ready to be appliqued. You can use old dryer sheets for this. Fusible web eliminates pinning and works well for scallops and curves. Beulah little likes to cut away the background fabric behind her appliqué when she is finished this makes quilting a lot easier as there are not so many layers to quilt through. Some women like to use sequin pins to hold the appliqué piece to the background and some like to pin from the back this is to keep the thread from tangling with the pins and then some also like to use silk thread as they say that it is smoother. With hand appliqué package the necessary pieces in Ziploc bags for each block this makes it easier to take with you when you have to wait for some one. Have a go bag that you can keep ever thing in when not working on it, this way you just need to grab the bag and go. At home you can also try a magnified light it helps to create precise appliqué stitches.


If you have trouble keeping your seam allowance together when sewing try using the small plastic coffee stir sticks to guide the fabric through the sewing machine. They are rigid enough to hold the fabric and if you hit it with your machine needle the needle won't break or cause damage to your machine. When I travel or sit in my living room to sew I like to have my scissors and my thimbles on a lanyard to wear around my neck. This keeps me from losing them in the car or in the chair I'm setting in.

We all handle our bindings differently; after pressing, I roll it on an empty thread spool and then set the spool on my thread cone holder. As I sew the binding on the quilt I just pull it off the spool. My holder was packed away and I didn't want to dig it out so I went to my husband, Jerry, and asked him to please make a holder for me. He went out to his shop and took a piece of wood 3.5 X 3.5 X 1 inch and put a 4 inch finish nail (one without a large head on it) in the middle of the wood. He brought it in to me; it works like a champ I did put some rubber under so it would not scratch my sewing desk. I will continue to use this.

We all love fun tips to make our sewing better so now what tips can you give to us? See you next month with more useful or useless tips and ideas. Mary Ann

Treasurer's Report - Janine Walker

Retreats - Janine Walker

Bring your sewing machine, and work on your own projects. If you're stuck, there is a wealth of information and helpful women who will share their knowledge and ideas with you. And the food is great, too.

As many of you know, there has been a change of management at Gwinwood, where we hold our retreats. They are working very hard to bring the place back from many years of neglect. This has brought on a rather hefty increase in the fees that are being charged, which become effective-July 1. The daily charge for the use of the building has more than doubled. The overnight rate is staying the same, but they are raising the minimum from 15 to 20. I am currently negotiating with the director, and she has agreed to give us a one year extension of the 15 overnight count. We have rarely had the 15, but pay for them anyway. That's 45 overnights per retreat. Last year we averaged 38. It looks to me like the cost per day for retreats is going to need to go up to \$42.50 per day, an increase of \$10 per day. This is still a bargain when compared to any other retreat facility I have known of. I have records for the last 10 years, which I will have at the business meeting. Over the years, the retreat has given over \$3000 back to the club. It may be time to use some of that to subsidize upcoming retreats. Also, there will be an up-front 20% deposit for upcoming retreats, which we have not had to deal with before. Probably because we do 5 per year. So far I have not been able to book retreats for next year. I have let the director know that we would like to have our June retreat back on its original date, during shop hop.

Our next retreat is October 13 to 16. After that is November 6 - 9, Monday thru Thursday.

Of interest about our Retreats: Janine has been keeping track of how many of us attend retreats since

In 2008 there were 5 retreats and a total of 83 people attended, the most in November, the fewest in October; and the cost was just \$25/night.

2009 again had 5 retreats, with a total of 86 attendees, a little more evenly split between the retreats. 2010 brought 5 retreats with a total of 78 people attending.

In 2011, there was a price reduction to \$23/day, and the 5 retreats had a total of 109 people with 13 staying all 4 days in November.

2012 had a total of 101 retreatants.

2013 was a big year with a total of 114 people attending 6 retreats, most of them in the May through November retreats

120 also attended the 6 retreats in 2014. There was a price hike to \$25/day in 2015 and then mid-year to \$30/day, but a total of 100 people attended the 6 retreats.

2016 brought another price hike to \$32.50/day and there were 97 people.

This year, so far, we've had a total of 47 attend the 3 retreats. The price will go up to \$42.50 on July 1st.

Sometimes there are visitors; sometimes there are people who stay only 1 or 2 days, some for the 3 days or the entire time. Retreats are always fun.

Our panels will be going to our Cancer Care guilt program.


Rules:
